FACT SHEET

The Carl & Marilynn Thoma Art Foundation recognizes the power of the arts to challenge and shift perceptions, spark creativity, and connect people across cultures. The Foundation lends and exhibits artworks and supports pivotal initiatives in the arts, providing grants to nonprofit organizations whose innovative projects and original ideas will advance scholarship in the arts. The Foundation is a 501(c)3 organization founded in 2014, based in Chicago, Illinois, and Santa Fe, New Mexico.

What We Do

Since 2015, the Foundation has lent more than 1,000 works of art to over 115 exhibitions across the globe; made over 75 grants to nonprofit organizations; awarded funding to 21 individuals for scholarly research; and hosted 26 exhibitions at its spaces.

Artwork loans

Exhibition loans to national and international venues from the collection areas.

Supporting scholarship in the Art of the Spanish Americas collection area with the Marilynn Thoma Fellowship, Research and Travel Awards, and the Marilynn Thoma Scholar at the University of Illinois Chicago

Quarterly exhibits of works from our collection at Art House in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and our newest Santa Fe venue opening in mid-2021, Art Vault, and by appointment at Orange Door in Chicago, Illinois

Grants

Funding flagship exhibitions, fostering cutting-edge scholarship, and supporting enterprising nonprofit organizations across a variety of grantmaking initiatives including our new Digital Changemaker Grant, Thoma Equity Grant, and Publications Grant

The Collection

The Foundation collection is comprised of over 1,400 artworks and spans four broad fields.

Art of the Spanish Americas (1600–1825)

More than 160 works from the 17th to 19th centuries, principally paintings from South America

Digital & Electronic Art (1959–present)

Includes algorithmic software, internet-connected and real-time animation, early computer drawing, interactive technology, video installation, and electronic sculpture **Japanese Bamboo** (1840s–present)

Contemporary bamboo baskets and sculptural bamboo representing both independent artists and artists from the two professional associations devoted to the field



Post-War Painting & Sculpture (1950–1979)

Centered around the major movements of the period including Color Field, Hard Edge, Op, Washington Color School, Light & Space, and shaped canvas
